UNIVERSITY COLLEGE offers adults the resources of the University of Chicago. The Downtown Center, at 19 South La Salle Street, gives credit and informal classes from early morning to late at night, including some programs for Master's degrees. The Home-Study Department offers correspondence courses on the University level. The Radio Office produces the University of Chicago's radio and television programs. The Union Education Service works with trade-union leaders. The World Politics Program fosters community discussion groups. Community self-help in human relations problems is encouraged by a special staff. Separate brochures are available on these, as on such other enterprises as the Basic Program of Liberal Education for Adults, the Program in Publishing and Graphic Arts, and Special Services to Business and Industry. The Executive Program and the M.B.A. Program are offered by the School of Business at 190 East Delaware Place.

THE WOMAN'S COLLEGE BOARD is a non-profit organization for the alumnae of 29 liberal arts colleges for women. It sponsors for the Chicago area a series of radio programs by member colleges, and is an associate member of the Chicago Educational Television Association. College counseling is given without charge by the Executive Secretary at 30 North Michigan Avenue. College information is provided by a continuously revised Handbook. This year a forum on "Living with Education" will be presented at the Palmer House on February 6, 1957.
