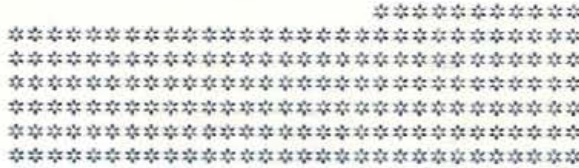

1978 Program of Field Trips

The Field Trips are conducted on a Tuesday or a Wednesday the week following each lecture. A tour ticket is valid only on the date for which the ticket is issued and must be presented for admission. **There are no refunds on field trip tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can be made.** The price of each tour is \$15.00. Luncheon (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. **Tours depart from and return to the Clinton Street (west) Entrance to the Chicago & North Western Station.** Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for late-comers. Comfortable shoes are recommended. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change. **Please read carefully the instructions on How to Order Tickets.**

Tour One Tuesday, Sept. 19 • Wednesday, Sept. 20
Depart 8:50 AM from North Western Station via CTA Culture buses, with onboard explanation of their public arts program. For the rest of the day, we will look at the range of CETA* funded artist-in-residence programs in Chicago. First stop will be the Hubbard Street, mile-long mural, with discussion by its artistic staff. Proceed to historic St. James Cathedral, survivor of the Chicago Fire, for program and discussion by

dancers in residence. Our next stop will be the Lincoln Park Zoo where we'll meet and see artists working on a mural project in the reptile house, an environmental sculpture, and the poetry-in-the-zoo project. We will have lunch and spend the afternoon at Navy Pier, including an explanation of the renovation, a walking tour, and theater performances by the children's theater and Shakespeare company. Return to North Western Station at 3:45 PM.

Tour Two Tuesday, Oct. 3 • Wednesday, Oct. 4
Departing North Western Station at 8:50 AM, we will stop at Frank Lloyd Wright's Unity Temple, Lake and Kennilworth, to learn about Oak Park's renaissance. A guided bus tour of the Village will illustrate the effect of both private and public renovations on economic development. We will visit the new mall and see the birthplace of Ernest Hemingway and the home of Edgar Rice Burroughs. Lunch will be at the Oak Park Club. From here, we will go by bus to Frank Lloyd Wright's Home and Studio for a guided tour of this historic landmark. Then, we will walk down Forest Avenue, a veritable museum of Frank Lloyd Wright houses, after which the Thomas Gale home

will be opened for us. The tour will conclude with a stop at the new Village Hall designed by Harry Weese. Return to North Western Station by 3:30 PM.

Tour Three Tuesday, Oct. 17 • Wednesday, Oct. 18
 Depart at 8:50 AM for the Second Presbyterian Church, a Chicago landmark, Michigan Ave. at 20th St., to learn something of its history and see the Tiffany windows. South to Hyde Park Blvd. where KAM-Isaiah Israel, oldest Jewish congregation in Illinois, occupies a mosque-like temple, also a Chicago landmark. At Graham Taylor Chapel, University Ave. and 58th St., Pres. Charles Shelby Rooks of the Chicago Theological Seminary will explain the Chicago Cluster of Theological Schools. Lunch prepared by the Effendi Turkish restaurant will be served in the Cloister Room, Ida Noyes Hall, The University of Chicago. Tour will conclude with a visit to Christ Universal Temple, 8601 S. State St., to see the facility and meet the Rev. Johnnie Coleman, Minister and Founder. Buses leave for North Western Station at 3:00 PM.

Tour Four Tuesday, Oct. 31 • Wednesday, Nov. 1
 Proceed promptly at 8:50 AM to South West Supplementary Fuel Processing facility, a unique operation sponsored by the City of Chicago and Commonwealth Edison Co., where residential refuse is converted into electricity—lecture and tour. Depart 11:00 AM for the Lyric Opera of Chicago, where a

rehearsal or lecture will be followed by buffet luncheon served in the glamorous Green Room. At 1:15 PM proceed to the Tribune Tower for special presentation and tour including the City Room, the new Tribune Kitchen and Special Features department, and the newspaper presses. Buses will depart at 3:15 PM for the North Western Station.

Tour Five Tuesday, Nov. 14 • Wednesday, Nov. 15
 Depart 8:50 AM for the South Shore Country Club, 7059 S. South Shore Dr., a unique facility on the Lake, now operated by the Chicago Park District whose purchase saved it from demolition. Its fate remains undecided. The Park District and community groups will discuss history, plans and problems before a tour of this faded but still majestic landmark. Then visit the Central Water Filtration Plant, built 1972, world's largest such facility, for an inspection of laboratories and plant and presentation by the chief engineer on the special challenges and trends in today's water supply. Lunch at Chicago Yacht Club, Belmont at Belmont Harbor. Finally, visit the small, yet vital, Chicago Academy of Sciences, founded 1857, the oldest museum in Chicago and the oldest scientific museum in the West. Dr. William Beecher, Director, will present a lively history of the Academy and, then, give a special behind-the-scenes tour of the "Life Zones of the World" exhibit, now under construction. Return to North Western Station by 3:30 PM.

A Series Subscription consists of four tours. Preference will be given to Series Subscriptions which will be issued in order of their receipt. (2) A subscriber who gives only one choice will have his order returned if the series of his choice has been sold out. (3)

It is also important to show whether the alternate day of the week is acceptable if the weekday you prefer is sold out.
