1979 Program of Field Trips

The Field Trips are conducted on a Tuesday or a Wednesday the week following each lecture. A tour ticket is valid only on the date for which the ticket is issued and must be presented for admission. There are no refunds on field trip tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can be made. The price of each tour is \$15.00 except for Tour 5A, which is \$22.00. Luncheon (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. Tours depart from and return to the Clinton Street (west) Entrance to the Chicago & North Western Station with the exception of Tour 2 (see description). Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for late-comers. Comfortable shoes are recommended. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change. Please read carefully the instructions on How to Order Tickets.

Tour One Tuesday, Sept. 18 • Wednesday, Sept. 19 Depart from the North Western Station at 9 A.M. for a vantage point on Roosevelt Road where an overview will show the progress of Dearborn Park and its proximity to the Loop. We then move to the nearby Polk Street Station and Printer's Row to visit renovated buildings, artists' studios, and a fascinating bookstore. Then on to Wicker Park, one of the historic communities established in the early 1860's, prior to the Chicago Fire. It is being revitalized by the residents of this Victorian neighborhood, and by visiting some homes we shall see what has been accomplished. Lunch will be catered in St. Paul's Lutheran Church. The last stop will be a unique enclave of 19th century houses, the community established by McCormick Seminary. We shall walk through the complex and have an opportunity to see some of the interiors. Return to North Western Station by 3:30

Tour Two Tuesday, Oct. 2 • Wednesday Oct. 3 The tour commences at 8:55 A.M. at the Illinois Central Gulf underground commuter station at Michigan and Randolph. (Please note change from the usual depature time and location.) Aboard a special commuter Highliner car, railroad officials will detail commuter, passenger and freight services. At the Hazel Crest Station buses will transport the tour group to I.C.G. Markham Yard to see freight car classification, the repair yard and the Woodcrest Locomotive Shop. Lunch at the Holiday Inn, Harvey. From the Inn we will go to the Union Tank Car Co.'s midwest manufacturing facility. We will be taken on a tour of Union Tank's highly automated, \$50 million complex, occupying a 46 acre site, to see first-hand how railroad tank cars are precision built. Board buses for I.C.G. and/or North Western railroad depot with arrival in Chicago at 3:30 P.M.

Tour Three Tuesday, Oct. 16 • Wednesday, Oct. 17 Depart 9:00 A.M. for the auditorium of the Prudential Building, Prudential Plaza, Randolph Street entrance for greetings and a briefing by Jack Kopp, President of Leo Burnett. We will be divided into groups and proceed to conference rooms where we will get an insight into various facets of the world of advertising. After lunch at the Wedgwood Room of Marshall Field & Company, we will tour the display department. We will see the development of Field's windows and store decorations and preview Christmas of '79. Buses leave for the North Western Station at 3:10 P.M.

Tour Four Tuesday, Oct. 30 . Wednesday, Oct. 31 Depart from North Western Station at 8:50 A.M. for a visit to the highly acclaimed Misericordia Home for special children, operated by the Sisters of Mercy. Enroute, we will stop briefly to view the brightly colored Illinois Regional Library for the Blind and the Physically Handicapped. From there we will visit La Rabida Children's Hospital and Research Center, where we will see their facilities and their school for inpatients. We will lunch in the lakefront activities room. In the afternoon we will visit the Jane A. Neil Elementary School and learn how handicapped children are mainstreamed with their normal peers. In addition, we will see a performance by members of Imagination Theater, a unique concept in creative dramatics in which student members of the audience are participants. Buses will return to the North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Five Tuesday, Nov. 13 . Wednesday, Nov. 14 NEW Tour 5A-TUESDAY EVENING: Depart promptly at 4:30 P.M. for Jazz Showcase (901 N. Rush St.) for an after-work jazz session and a discussion by Charles Sherrell, General Manager of WBEE lazz Radio. We will have dinner with music in the Pinnacle Room atop the Holiday Inn. After dinner we will go to Rick's Cafe for demonstrations of jazz styles by Bradley Parker Sparrow, Jazz Composer in Residence, followed by a performance by Geraldine de Haas, noted jazz vocalist and performing artist; and a performance by drummer and virtuoso, Shelly Mann. Our last stop will be at Orphans to hear "Ears," the unique jazz group composed of Chicago Symphony and studio musicians. Buses will leave at 9:15 P.M. for the North Western Station with a stop at the Holiday Inn.

Tour 5B Wednesday: Depart at 9:15 A.M. for De Paul University School of Music for performances and discussion of jazz styles by faculty and guest artists. After a brief tour of the School of Music, we will go to the Recital Hall for a performance and discussion of jazz dancing by the Joel Hall Company. After a buffet lunch in the Pinnacle Room atop the Holiday Inn we will go to Rick's Cafe for performances by Adegoke Steven Colson, Pianist, composer, saxaphonist, teacher and member of AACM,; Geraldine de Haas, noted jazz vocalist and performing artist; and a performance by Bradley Parker Sparrow, Jazz Composer in Residence. Return to North Western Station by 3:00 P.M.
